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"WHAT'S IN A NAME?" (SHAKESPEARE) PART II WRITTEN BY: REV. JOSEPH A. GORDON '59

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Countless elementary and junior high school students at OLPH, as well as CCD young folks and catechists, remember that Top Of the Hill landmark fondly known as "OLPH School", or simply "OLPH", which opened its doors to nine grades in September 1947. However, in addition to the extraordinary educational opportunities for all K through 8 grade levels in the new building, two stunning vistas were also welcomed: from the library windows, the Farallón Islands and beyond unfold magnificently (if the fog is not too assertive); and from the upper floor classrooms overlooking Wellington Avenue, a perhaps-nodding student could view the Bay Bridge, the east Bay, and downtown San Francisco. Unfortunately, though, it is likely that only a few know much about the person who, as the first among a team of equals, oversaw the dream of that edifice becoming a reality. He was OLPH Pastor from 1939 to 1968, Father (later Monsignor) James Bergin. Equally important on that team of equals were OLPH Principal (1945-51) Sister of St Joseph of Orange, Mary Clarice Doyle, and her Sister- and lay teacher- colleagues. Here, then, is a look back at the first among those equals, whose name is seen on the bronze dedication plaque at the main entrance to our alma mater, "School and Hall, Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish, Erected A.D. 1947, Reverend James Bergin, Pastor".

Born in Fairfield, County Leix, Ireland on May 22, 1890, James Bergin attended Ireland's prestigious St Patrick's College, Maynooth for his final two university years, where he majored in Sacred Scripture and history. Released by his Diocesan bishop in Ireland for priestly "missionary" work in the U.S. Diocese of Richmond, Virginia in 1912, Bergin completed his final four seminary years at St Mary's Seminary in Baltimore ("I sailed across the Atlantic for America not long after the Titanic", he would point out). Ordained in Baltimore on May 25, 1916, after two assignments in the Richmond Diocese Bergin was persuaded by his Maynooth classmate who accompanied him to St Mary's, Thomas Millett, to request permission to accompany him for service in the Archdiocese of San Francisco. The Bishop of Richmond granted his request, and since San Francisco Archbishop Edward Hanna had already heard of Bergin's impressive academic record in Maynooth and Baltimore, Hanna eventually assigned the young priest to the Church of the Nativity in Menlo Park, and he encouraged Bergin to accept a part-time position as Instructor of Sacred Scripture on the faculty of nearby College of the Sacred Heart, at the request of the Sisters who conducted the College. In 1930, though, the campus was moved to San Francisco, where it would henceforth be known as "San Francisco College for Women", popularly called "Lone Mountain". Bergin nevertheless continued at the new site for six years, where he was consistently considered a superb classroom professor. The Sisters valued his part-time role, and to that end, wishing to retain him yet not wanting to burden him – he had by then been appointed pastor of Our Lady of the Pillar parish in Half Moon Bay – they adjusted his schedule to facilitate the long drive from the coast to Lone Mountain. Moving to Sebastopol in 1936, however, made it impossible for him to continue his teaching duties.

Following his time in Sebastopol, Fr Bergin was named Pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in 1939, where he remained after his retirement in 1968 until his passing on September 5, 1971. With his long-standing interest in schools and academics, and knowing that the school facilities at OLPH in 1939 were painfully inadequate, he agreed to the Archbishop's request to erect a new building, although he was somewhat fearful of the impending debt. Making matters even more challenging were the post-World War II mandatory restrictions on most all construction work.

Bergin had established a reputation as an outstanding teacher who could work well with Sisters, but in the late 1950s he encountered numerous difficulties with OLPH School's administration at the time. Some even felt that he was barely tolerating, at best, the presence of the Sisters. When a new Sister-principal was named by Orange to help improve things, the Superior General made it clear to Sister: "If you have any problems with 'that pastor', please let me know immediately and I will begin the process of withdrawing our Sisters completely. Enough is enough." (Sister Clarice had admirably completed her six-year term in 1951, as did her respected replacement six years later). Orange had made a wise choice for a replacement to follow Sr Clarice and her successor, and while in his final pre-retirement years Bergin wholeheartedly supported the new principal and her staff. Throughout his pastorate Bergin was penurious with parish money, occasionally to the detriment of the physical parish plant – never with the school, however – but he successfully liquidated the enormous OLPH debt that he inherited upon his arrival in 1939, as well as the debt which resulted from the building of the new school in 1947.

Our Lady of Perpetual Help School of today, and the building in which educating and forming elementary school students – and their families – superbly carries on the school's admirable work, a fitting honor for that first name among a team of equals in the building of the Top of the Hill landmark, Monsignor James Bergin.

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

SISTER THECLA CHUML, C.S.J. August 11, 1929—August 26, 2020 OLPH TEACHER 1949-1951

Sister Thecla, native of Tustin, CA, entered the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange in 1946. Soon after her first vows, she began teaching elementary school full time in parishes both in northern and southern California as well as in Texas and Maui, Hawaii. Sr. Thecla received her BA from San Francisco College for women and her lifetime teaching credential from the State of California.

In 1974, she was asked to be the Activities Director at the Sisters' retirement house. Eleven years later she began serving as head librarian at St. Joseph Library; a post that she held for 15 years, overseeing the modernization of the library.

Sr. Thecla retired to Regina Residence. She entered eternal life on Aug. 26, 2020. Due to the pandemic, her funeral was private and she is interred at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery in Orange.
