In The Beginning...

Part 1 of "In The Beginning" was included in the Summer 2017 edition of the Perpetual Light, which can be found in the alumni section of our school website (www.olphdc.org). Part 1 ended in 1920 with Father Charles Bertola who was celebrating Mass in a small social hall in Daly City. Father Charles eventually went on to purchase the property on Wellington Avenue and named it after Saint Maximus. This was done to honor the primarily Irish and Italian communities during those years. A walk down Wellington Avenue today will reveal a polished cornerstone with the Latin words "ECCLESIA SANCTI MAXIMI, MCMXXV" (Church of Saint Maximus, 1925).

Once the Daly City Catholic community was formally independent of Holy Angels, Father Bertola moved the Sunday Masses and other Sacramental services from Ryan's Hall to the larger though still inadequate second floor hall of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, located in a now demolished building at 6274 Mission Street. Finally, on April 5th, 1925, less than one month after the founding of St. Maximus Parish and barely one year after Bertola presented to Hanna his pastoral plan for Daly City, Archbishop Hanna appointed Father James P. Donohoe, 40, as the first pastor of St. Maximus. Born in Bogesky House, County Cavan, Ireland, Donohoe arrived in Daly City after serving 5 years in his first pastorate at St. Joseph Church, in the small Sacramento River delta town of Rio Vista. He apparently showed much promise during his studies at St. Patrick's Seminary in Carlow, Ireland, and was chosen to spend one year after his 1909 ordination in Ireland to pursue graduate studies at St. Bernard Seminary, Rochester, New York, prior to his departure for San Francisco. Coincidentally, Archbishop Hanna, a native of Rochester, had once been a professor on the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Father Donohoe's first residence was a small 1900s wood frame house one block away from the church on Wellington Avenue, and he lived there until moving into the newly completed rectory adjacent to the church on August 15th, 1926, with his newly-assigned Assistant Father Luigi Sciocchetti. Donohoe soon set up all of the Sacramental activities that are a part of Catholic parish life. He began daily and weekend Masses, and officiated the sacraments of Baptism, Marriage, and Penance as needed. He guided the preparation of young people for First Holy Communion and Confirmation through the Catechism program, soon afterwards contractually entrusted to the Sisters of the Holy Family. He arranged the Archbishop's biannual visits for the Sacrament of Confirmation, visited the sick and homebound for the Sacrament of the Sick (known for years as "the Last Rites"), and officiated at funeral rites and cemetery services. However, Donohoe recognized that Daly City's residents, predominantly struggling truck farmers and laborers, were not affluent. Most families were young, and out of necessity he promptly developed numerous ongoing fundraisers that would not be overly burdensome to his parishioners – whist parties, bingo games, yearly parish festivals, religious articles sales, bake sales and Christmas boutiques, to name just a few examples -- in order to pay back to the Archdiocese the loan secured by Father Bertola for the building of the new church. In addition to this repayment, he also hoped that he could begin to keep the parish solvent. Regrettably, he apparently was only slightly successful in both addressing the loan and maintaining solvency.
